You will only realize all of the good works of our volunteers through this newsletter because you work so quietly behind the scenes. But the people we serve know and value you



more than they can ever express. At times, relationships flower that go beyond our mission. But always, our so-busy volunteers find time in their daily schedules to minister to those in need. You are angels of mercy, the "salt of the earth," dependable, patient and

always respectful.

We don't plan to be alone later in life with no resources such as the ability to drive, or relatives who live far away or no one local to help when we are ill or injured. It just happens. And for so many, there is nowhere to

turn. I don't think many realize how unique this ministry is in Orlando and elsewhere. This safety net for people in our

community just isn't available elsewhere, so people are often forced to move to assisted living, long before they are ready to or actually have the need. There are many we have helped in the past who were able to live out their lives in their own homes because of our volunteers. That is truly amazing.

So do it! Pat yourselves on the back for a job well done. We may sit next to another volunteer in church and never know it, but there is One who does know. You evangelize through your good works as the Lord commanded in Matthew 5:16. "Just so, your light must shine before others that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." That's you....that's what you do.

WHEN ONLY A MAN WILL DO

Ok, now that we have your attention, we would like to ask for some help from the men who volunteer for Chicken Soup.

Occasionally we get a request from a man (or someone in his

family) who is in need of a visitor. Generally the person is home bound and either lives alone, or with children who work. Others may have recently lost a spouse and are experiencing the grief of that loss and could just use a friend. See Page 2 for the rest of this article.

When only a man will do. (Continued.) Because they can no longer drive, it can mean a long, lonely day. Most of our volunteers who like to make visits are women. Because men nor-

mally prefer male company, Chicken Soup often cannot help. We don't get these requests often, but when we do it is so difficult to not be able to help someone who has reached out to our Church. These men are suddenly cut off from the community and often were active parishioners. It is very sad to think how they must feel....that they are no longer important to our SMM Community.

Volunteers spend about an hour visiting the person in his

homes. If the person is able, sometimes we take him out for coffee; but only if the volunteer wishes to do so and it has been approved by the family.



So if you think you may be called to this aspect of the Ministry, please let us know. As always, it would be at your convenience with no regular commitment. And, if you have friends who might be interested in joining our team, in any capacity, please continue to be our best recruiters.

Thank you for all that you do. Our parish is certainly blessed with many men of tremendous faith that translates into action.

Volunteers do not necessarily have the time — they just have the heart.

Would **You** like to be a Team Leader or Volunteer Coordinator?

Being a member of the leadership team as a Team leader (TL) or Volunteer Coordinator (VC) for Chicken Soup is an extremely rewarding experience. Working with all of you, the team drives the organization and keeps it running smoothly. The leadership team shapes how we operate, makes decisions about how to handle situations and supports one another in our roles.

How the Leadership Team Works

After a phone assessment with someone who has requested help, I ask one of our TL's if she is available to take a new case. She can say "not now" just as you can with assignments. Once a TL is designated, she will make contact with the potential Care Recipient (CR). She sets up a time for an in-home meeting to talk about the CR's needs and what Chicken Soup might be able to do to help. If she assesses that we can meet his needs, she will set up the CR's initial services and report the information to the Team. If there are any concerns, I generally discuss them with her and we may or may not go forward at that time. If that is the case, either Mary Ann Gilbert or I talk to the person and explain

the situation.
